SECTION A

① Priestley uses the character of Eric to show hope for change in the younger generation by listening to the unjust capitalist views of his father and friends, like Eric does. He hopes for change in social views in future the younger generation. Priestley uses Eric's own opinion and to show that people change no matter what.

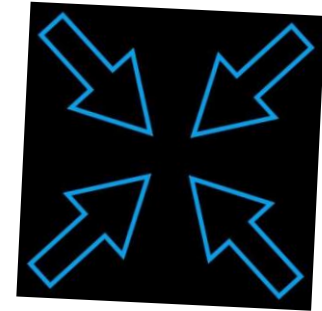
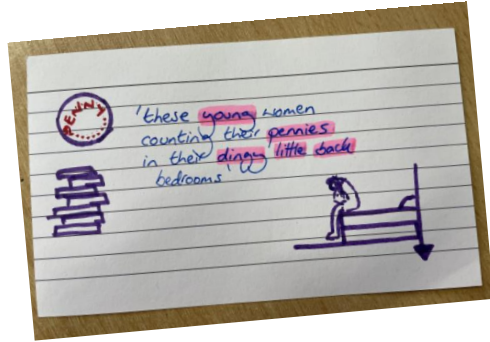
At the beginning Priestley wants us to initially recognise Eric's original childish and immature state. Priestley describes his character as 'natty shy, natty assertive' in opening stage directions. Perhaps this implies that Eric doesn't feel at ease in his 'natty heavily comfortable' family environment and doesn't quite fit in with his middle class family. The adjective 'shy' has connotations of childishness as he perhaps feels a heavy sense of discomfort around his family. This is perhaps the reason for his weighty dependence on alcohol.

Eric's immaturity is again reiterated when he 'suddenly guffaws' and interrupts Sheila and Gerald whilst claiming he doesn't know why he is laughing. The immature laugh suggests he doesn't know how to act around his family so resorts to laughing awkwardly to symptom the tension and awkwardness in that formal setting. This again emphasises his need for alcohol as a way of coping in these situations. Perhaps Priestley alternatively

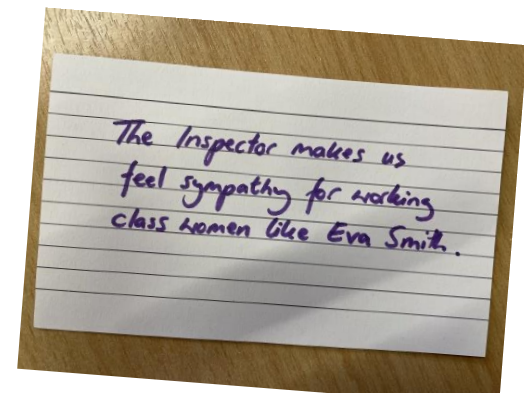

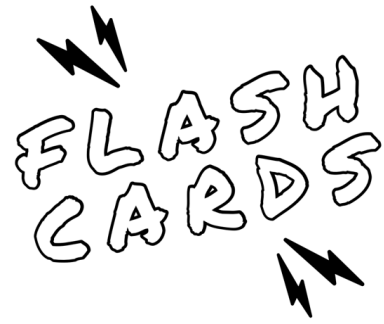
# 5 tips for effective flash cards

# FLASH CARDS




1. Make your own!
2. Reduce to expand.
3. Use pictures and mnemonics but don't mistake colouring for work!
4. Make sure that there is a question on the reverse. Test yourself both ways.
5. Commit to an answer. Recall, not recognition.





# Why are these not effective flash cards?

**BLOOD**



✎ Blood should signify the stability of the kingdom through the support of loyal nobility – Macbeth as ‘peerless kinsman’ – and the dynastic succession of a rightful heir to the throne, Malcolm.

✎ However, Duncan’s ‘golden blood’ – the ‘spring, the head, the fountain’ of kingship – is unnaturally ‘stopp’d’ and so blood instead becomes a symbol of guilt; it is a stain – a ‘spot’ – that cannot be removed, will turn ‘multitudinous seas’ red, and is as irresistible as their tides.

✎ My hands are of your colour; but I shame / To wear a heart so white (Lady Macbeth, 2:2)

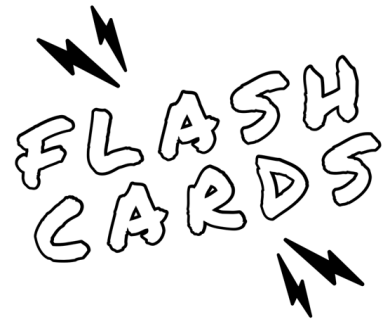
