Alumni Visit – Dr Emma Curtis

Martyn Coombs writes: Year 10 Bedale High School students recently welcomed former pupil, Dr Emma Curtis to talk about her career and the opportunities there are for people to secure careers in the care world.

Inspired by her science teacher Mrs McGuinness, Emma completed her GCSE's in 2010 and after her A levels, she was devastated to receive four rejections from medical schools. She emphasised just how much those rejections made her more committed to overcome this setback and after a gap year dispensing medicines in a pharmacy, she successfully applied to Durham University Medical School. Building up her CV was essential which meant volunteering as a swimming coach at Bedale Sharks, as a lunchtime assistant on a stroke rehab ward and becoming a Breathing Space volunteer. She said 'prospective interviewers and employers always look at the extra voluntary things that people are engaged in, in their spare time.'

Emma qualified as a foundation doctor in 2019 and she has experienced work on the acute medical ward, trauma and orthopaedics, accident and emergency, psychiatry and more recently, obstetrics and gynaecology. Emma said 'Last week I was working in the delivery suite at the RVI in Newcastle and delivered two babies naturally, one set of twins and two C-section babies and as it was International Women's Day, all five babies just had to be female!' Emma talked about the fantastic perks of the job working with an incredible team, travelling to

New Zealand, the fact that every day is different and the ability to change people's lives. She also talked about dealing with traumatic injuries in A&E and sometimes having to make that heartbreaking decision to turn a machine off. She has missed out on so many Christmas and New Year celebrations and has missed many weddings and anniversaries such is the pressure of shift work and 60 hour working weeks but, she said 'I wouldn't change anything about my career. I love every day of my working life.' Finally, Emma offered advice to the students as they approach their examinations, to plan a revision programme that included rest breaks and to have the courage to overcome whatever obstacles came their way.

Bedale High School acknowledges that pupils do sometimes need positive support, and Room 15 aims to be a safe place in which pupils can explore ways to navigate the challenges they may be experiencing. Pupils who are experiencing barriers to their learning, due to emotional or behavioural (and not academic) factors, are supported to meet their needs, by the pastoral team who deal with any concern promptly and sensitively.

When supporting pupils in school we aim to build positive relationships to ensure that we provide the best possible pastoral care for the children and families in our school community. Science Update

Mrs Faint writes: In Year 8 some students were doing practical work to identify the products of photosynthesis.

Here is one of their original green leaves to compare with the "blue/black" colour of the leaf treated with iodine. The students explained that this shows the leaf contained starch, stored by the plant as the glucose it produces in photosynthesis is soluble. Their next challenge is to predict what the results from the variegated (two coloured) leaf would show and why.

Meanwhile in year 11 - students have been modelling the hydrocarbon series known as alkanes with paperchains! The green is carbon, the red hydrogen and they are covalently bonded as shown by the white paper. Lauren's collection shows Methane (CH4), Ethane (C2H6), Propane (C3H8) and Butane can you work out the formula for this last one?
